- Analysis and reporting of


- Working with three pilot communities, comprising Willowra, Pmara Jutunta and Wurrumiyanga.

This year...




This year, Amity Community Services will continue to work with communities to minimise the harms from gambling through a health promotion approach. The health promotion approach has five key elements:
